

## Sales tax revenues trend up for January

Municipalities in Donley County started off the calendar year with positive sales tax growth when Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar distributed January allocations last week.

The City of Clarendon's revenue was up 2.81 percent for the month at \$39,535.48 compared to \$38,454.40 at this time in 2024.

Hedley was up 9.68 percent with an allocation of \$874.43 compared to \$797.23 last January.

Howardwick's allocation was up 42.85 percent to \$1,812.53 this month, beating last January's revenue of \$1,268.81.

The new Donley County Assistance District Number One in Howardwick brought in \$1,132.90 to assist law enforcement in the county. That sales tax started being levied in October following approval of Howardwick voters last May.

Statewide, Hegar delivered \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for January, 0.3 percent more than in January 2024. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

## **Constitution 101:**

# Senate makeup and vacancies

Section III of Article I of the Constitution is all about the Senate. When reading the original Section III before modern amendments, right away one might notice some differences in the Senate today from when the Founders created it, and I have found that most Americans are surprised. Article I, Section III, Clause I of the Constitution States, "The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have

one Vote."

The first, third and fourth parts have not changed: each state has two senators, each senator serves for six years, and each senator has one vote. The number of senators was a result of the "Great Compromise." One of the largest points of contention

in drafting the Constitution was should representation be the same for all states as it was in the Articles of Confederation or should representation be based on population of the state. As you can guess the larger states wanted proportional representation, but smaller states wanted equality. New Hampshire for one instructed its delegates to vote against any document that had proportional representation. These smaller states had become used to equal power in the Articles of Confederation. This debate was so contentious that a special committee was formed to make a final decision. It was decided that the lower house, the House of Representatives, the house that represented the people directly should be based on population while the upper house, the Senate, the house that represented the states or the elites as it mimicked the House of Lords back in England should be equal, two each. Having the Senate equal also protected the states from new amendments to the Constitution. In the House, larger states would have the votes necessary to get a two-thirds majority to pass any amendment over the smaller ones, but it would be impossible to do so in the Senate.

If how senators were chosen might sound confusing and shows that there was not originally as much democracy as we often think, "[Senators were] chosen by the Legislature thereof." According to the original Constitution, members of the House of Representatives were the only positions elected by the people. The members of the Senate were not chosen by the people until an amendment changed it in 1913. This goes back to the discussion of a republic verses a democracy. America was set up as a republic instead of the democracy mainly because the Founders did not trust the masses enough to give them a direct vote. The people were supposed to choose a representative - one of their betters - to make decisions for them. Well, that concept went even further with the Senate. The Founders did not even trust the people to choose their own senators.

Whereas the House of Representatives was based on the House of Commons in England, it made sense that the representatives were chosen by the those it directly represented. However, the Senate was based on the House of Lords who were not chosen by the people. If the Senate represented the elites or the states themselves, then the Senators could not be beholden to the people. If the people chose them then they would have to answer to them. Instead, members of the state legislatures chose senators, so the senators now had to answer to the state instead of the people. Something that has not changed is that senators are elected for six years. The difference in years from the House is again reflecting the importance of the two houses. The House represents the people and so the people need to make sure their interests are being represented by electing them every two years to keep them honest. By making the senate a six-year term it would have much more stability. Clause II was an extension of the six-year rule. It states, "Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year." Basically, what it's saying is that while senators are chosen for six-year terms, a third of them will be chosen every two years. By not having all the senators chosen at the same time as the House, the Senate will have much more stability. In theory the House can replace all its representatives in any given election, while the Senate can only replace one-third. The two senators from each state will be staggered so there will always be an experienced senator if the other is replaced. While the final part of Clause II was amended in 1913 with the 17th Amendment, it originally stated, "and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies." If a senator resigns or dies, the governor of the state can choose a replacement until the original senator's term is up. For a member of the House a special election is called but for a senator the governor gets to choose. Protecting the government from the masses was just as important to the Founders as protecting the people from the government. This is clearly seen in the way the upper house of Congress would not be swayed by the population.

# When the Frisco RR crossed the Katy

The railroad builders tied this land together with the cunning, courage, ingenuity, and humor that equals anything we have come to expect of the trappers, traders, miners, and homesteaders. When it came to being "men to match my mountains," the railroaders didn't take a back seat to anyone. They not only competed with and beat the terrain and the elements, they also competed with each other for the lucrative markets. And therein lie some of the best of tales.

Take the race into Indian Territory and on to Texas between the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad (known as the Katy) and the St. Louis-San Francisco Railroad (known as the Frisco). As the first railroad into Indian Territory, the Katy established the town of Downingville (now Vinita, Oklahoma) to be a gateway for wagon trains to the Southwest. Learning that the Frisco also had government permission to build through the current location of Downingville, the Katy sought to avoid sharing the town by relocating it two miles south. But the good citizens of Downingville didn't take kindly to such a move, so Downingville stayed where it



couldn't be moved, neither would the Katy allow the Frisco to cross its tracks even though, by law, they could not prevent it. Even a few days delay would benefit the Katy's cause.

As the showdown approached, the work crews of both lines began to swell with additional manpower, many of whom seemed more adept at handling guns than shovels. The Frisco built up to the proposed point of intersection, but there they were stymied. A Katy work train had the crossing point blocked, and it intended to stay there. The law required the train to keep moving, but it didn't have to move very far. So it kept reversing directions and kept the crossing point sufficiently blocked to thwart the Frisco. This went on for two was with the Frisco knocking at the door. days while the Frisco brass fumed. But



they weren't without their own bag of tricks, and on the third day they were ready.

When the Katy train stopped to reverse directions, a long line of prairie schooners moved in behind the train and started crossing the tracks, slowly and leisurely, in single file. By the time the last wagon had crossed, the first wagon had circled around and was right behind it. The schooners had the Katy train encircled and trapped because wagon trains had priority.

When the train was "released" a few hours later, the engineer raced back to the crossing point, but he was too late. The Frisco had crossed the Katy.

As the railroads built westward and southward, rivalry and subterfuge were a natural part of the competitive environment.

Although the Frisco won this confrontation, the Katy had its share of other victories and eventually was the first railroad into Texas from the north.



## Rambos from way back when in Texas

To most Texans, the name "Rambo" may mean little, but to Todd Compton it evokes memories from his childhood, when kinfolk spoke of 17th century ancestors who lived in what is now Philadelphia.

Peter Gunnarson Rambo (1611-1698) was most discussed, and Compton, now 52, remembers the accounts he heard in his grandmother's kitchen. His genealogical interest ignited, he didn't realize that the discussions would lead to a divine familial appointment in the summer of 2024.

Division Director of Geo-Environmental Services for Colliers Engineering and Design, he veered off course last spring during a tour of the company's area offices. He stopped at the Gloria Dei Episcopal Church, on whose grounds Rambo was buried ..... \*\*\*\*\*

He easily located the brick church, built between 1698-1703 - the oldest brick structure in Philadelphia. Previously, it was a log cabin church for 20 years. He wandered around the cemetery, hoping to find a grave marker for Peter Gunnarson Rambo.

Soon, he saw a lady working in a flower bed.

She, along with other Historic Gloria Dei Preservation Corporation volunteers, do what they can to maintain the church and cemetery. The location reeks of history. (Betsy Ross, the flagmaker, had a church wedding there in 1777.)...

\*\*\*\*\*

With limited time and resources, they have never-give-up attitudes, having just begun a campaign to fund further grave identification.

She confirmed that Peter – and other Rambos – were buried there, him likely near the front door which now is a side entry.

Todd and his associates - "all in" for the pro bono project - went to work in September. Gloria Dei would benefit, and the initiative could be helpful in training new hires for the 40-year-old company that has 3,200 employees in 78 locations, including one near the cemetery....

Todd was on fire with interest,

connecting facts with legends and hearsay. He learned that his tenth greatgrandfather was a respected visionary and resolute colonist. Rambo's ship - navigating the Atlantic Ocean in 1640 – had to return to Sweden twice for repairs, 136 years before there was a USA.

The grave is in a "prominent place," as had been heard, near the original front door that now is a side entry. Thanks to Colliers' ground penetrating radar, an emotional moment loomed. Todd stuck his fingers into the soil, perhaps two feet above the casket, saying, "I found you, man.... It's important for us to know that you are here, that you're still loved by your descendants, and that we're proud to have come from you."

Peter would father eight children who'd give him 37 grandchildren, and his accomplishments in what was called "New Sweden" are staggering. During his 60 years there, he helped William Penn found Philadelphia. He planted apple seeds brought from his homeland, thus explaining today's "Rambo" apples, and providing seeds for scattering by Johnny Appleseed. Rambo ultimately owned large land tracts that are now part of west and south Philadelphia.

Yes, movie star Sylvester Stallone - who played "Rambo" on the silver screen - was named for the colorful pioneers long before there was a Philadelphia Museum of Art, where Stallone later scaled the front steps triumphantly in the "Rocky" movies.... \*\*\*\*

Too bad they didn't have the Rambo facts at hand 55 years ago, when Todd's father, Mike, played professional baseball for the Philadelphia Phillies.

With a "Rambo" nickname, he'd have been a crowd favorite. In 1970, the team counted greatly on catchers Mike Ryan and Tim McCarver, who sustained broken hands in the same game. Enter young Compton to catch during most of the remaining games. Once, he literally "ripped his britches," quickly donning another pair found in the club house. Turns out, they were Philly star Johnny Callison's pants, a "fun fact" that didn't make the stats.

Mike was in professional baseball for 44 years, but injuries - including 14 surgeries - ended his playing career after nine seasons. With the Phillies for 34 years, he filled numerous off-the-field roles before retiring in 2015. A highlight of the Comptons' lives has been helping dozens of Latino players learn English as a second language, with many of them earning GEDs..

\*\*\*\*\*

I've known Mike and Jeanie - both campus favorites - since their college years. Mike was catcher for the vaunted Lobo baseballers who played at historic Kokernot Field, as did the Detroit Tigers' Norm Cash, the only other Sul Ross graduate with a career in the majors.

As Sul Ross PR director, I was on the trip when the Lobos toppled nationally-ranked Arizona State University in Tempe in 1964. It was a David and Goliath day!

Unquestionably, this Tampa, FL, couple has "swung for the fences" in life, with many "grand slams." They look forward to their 60th wedding anniversary come September.... \*\*\*\*
